Ken has been delivering food to Open Door Learning Center since 2013 and has participated in Learning Center events such as the Harvest party and Volunteer Appreciation Potluck. He volunteers year-round, visiting supermarkets around the metro and delivering thousands of pounds of fresh produce to learners at the site. The food deliveries help many of Open Door's learners supplement their limited income with healthy food; these kinds of services have been shown to reduce barriers to education for learners. Our learners come to us for education but have many needs beyond the classroom. By alleviating some of the worries, our learners have come to see school as a place that cares about their well-being.

Bob Young, 191 School for Adults, Burnsville-Eagan- Savage School District 191

Bob shared his ideas for addressing inequalities and other issues facing the school district with the superintendent in 2012, and then decided to get involved as a volunteer. Currently, Bob volunteers two nights a week in the GED class, helping students in all subject areas and one night a week helping specifically with math. When he's working individually with students, he is kind, patient, and encouraging. He will create his own lesson plans at home to challenge his students the following day of class. The students love Bob's charisma, humor and warmth.

Bob Reid, Metro South Adult Basic Education in Bloomington

Bob has been involved in the program since November 2004, when he retired from a career in chemical engineering. Bob leads a much-needed math group and also tutors students individually. Bob's innovation and creativity are part of his instruction, and he brings real world experience and skill to his classroom. He is approachable and friendly, creating instant rapport with his students, while making a real effort to understand their challenges and encouraging them to overcome their barriers and reach their goals. With the tight budgets we all live with, Bob helps the program and its students bridge a gap that could not otherwise be filled and saves the program countless dollars.

Valerie Meyer-DeJong, St. Paul Schools ABE (Hubbs Center)

Valerie has been volunteering at the Hubbs Center for 8 years, working alongside a teacher of adult immigrants in a low-level English literacy classroom. She also provides one-on-one help and assists with monthly assessments. Valerie develops personal relationships with her learners-- all of whom happily look forward to working with Valerie. Valerie and the teacher work as a team,



and she even substitutes when necessary. At one point, Valerie developed a very unique relationship with a special needs learner, and it was her actions that made it possible for the student to learn. Valerie's heartfelt dedication, dependability, and kind-hearted assistance are exemplary.

Jerry Hartlaub, Metro North - Columbia Heights/Fridley ABE

Jerry has been a consistent and dependable volunteer for about 2 and a half years. He plays many roles: To teachers he is a grandfather figure, mentor, and supporter. To students, he is someone who can listen and gently correct pronunciation along the way. All of the time he is a cheerleader, shaking hands, squeezing shoulders, fist bumping, and giving high fives. He connects to students' personal lives by insisting that his first interactions with each of them are not about the math they are working on but about their story. Jerry also works with newly arrived immigrants who have limited English skills, going over basic math vocabulary and drawing out pictures on the board. Weekly, students ask, "Will Jerry be here this week? What time is Jerry getting here? Can I be the first to work with Jerry?" When Jerry is out of town, we miss him. We can't think of a more deserving volunteer for this award.

Anna Posivo, English Learning Center

Anna arrived at the English Learning Center in 2009 after learning about it through the Minnesota Literacy Council. Anna teaches Beginning English one night a week which requires flexibility in communication, and this is an area where Anna is especially skilled. She will find multiple ways to explain the same concept several times. She includes visuals in every lesson and has come up with games to keep concepts interesting. Anna transcends language barriers with ease and has a patient, calm and welcoming presence. She balances being compassionate and gentle, while also holding students to high standards. She is known as the "ticket" teacher, a method she created to get students to try their best to only use English in class.

Under Lucille (or Lucy's) leadership, St. Paul became the first program in Minnesota to hold a GED graduation ceremony with caps and gowns. Lucy was also a founding member of the former professional organization, the Minnesota Association for Continuing Adult Education (MACAE).
